

## Overview of assessment

\* You will sit a writing test in May or June

\* Students will be expected to demonstrate an ability to use the language for different purposes and in different settings, although these can relate to the same theme. The examination features two tasks.

**Section 1:** Short writing (30-70 words). In this section you will have a choice of 4 questions. You choose and answer **ONE** question only.

**Section 2:** Long writing (120 -150 words). In this section you will have a choice of 4 questions. You choose and answer **ONE** question only.

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Good variety of appropriate vocabulary and structures.</li> <li>Some attempt to use ambitious structures with a fair measure of success.</li> <li>Unambiguous use of different verb tenses.</li> <li>Generally at ease with subordination.</li> </ul>	7-8

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Very accurate, though not necessarily faultless.</li> <li>Consistently good spelling and manipulation of language.</li> <li>Secure when using more complex language with only a few minor errors.</li> </ul>	5
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Generally accurate language.</li> <li>Most spelling and verb forms correct.</li> <li>When more complex structures are attempted, accuracy can be more variable.</li> </ul>	4
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>A fair number of errors made, including some basic, but communication overall unaffected.</li> <li>Straightforward and familiar language fairly accurately spelt and manipulated.</li> <li>Verbs more correct than incorrect.</li> <li>The work is clearly more accurate than inaccurate.</li> </ul>	3

**Section B: Long writing (120 words) in Arabic.**

**(30 marks)**

**(c) Write an article in Arabic entitled *السياحة في الوطن العربي* (tourism in the Arab World)**

**Give your opinion on what attracts travellers to some of the Arabic-speaking countries**

**You may wish to give examples of your own experience or the experience of people you know and say whether tourism will increase in these Arabic-speaking countries in the future.**

**Note:** Your answer might be written in all three tenses. You might add descriptions and opinions with reasons on Arabic countries, cities, food etc... (Mostly present tense).

You might write about any future plans to travel to the Arab World, say where and when and with whom you are going (future tense). You could also write a paragraph, in the past tense, about a trip you took in the Arab World or about Arab history and past achievements.

**Suggestions:**

Mention some important Arabic cities (Cairo, Beirut, Marrakech, Damascus etc... You could use what you have learned in my town and area and activities (places in town and what you can do in town etc).

Provide opinions with reasons.

You could add a past trip to the Arab as an example (past tense) or a future trip you are planning to the Arab world (**future tense**)

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**Possible answer: Use your generic vocabulary sheets to improve the text and add further details**

*I like Arabic and I love the Arab World. I love Arabs, Arabic culture and I also like Arabic food and clothes because it is exciting. I also like Arabic history because it is important and very rich. The Arab World is very interesting and very important because it has a rich and old history.*

*In the Arab World there are many historical and important cities and buildings. My favourite country is Lebanon; it is a beautiful and historic country. My favourite city in Lebanon is Beirut. Beirut is a big and modern city. In Beirut there are many beautiful cafes and there are also many interesting buildings. There are historical mosques and churches. There are also beautiful museums, cinemas and theatres. In Beirut you can swim in the sea because Beirut is a coastal city.*

*I also like Morocco, and my favourite city is Marrakech. Marrakech is a historical city, and the old medina in Marrakech is very interesting, shopping in it is fun and very interesting. Moroccan food is very delicious and in Marrakech there are many good and famous restaurants. Shopping in the Arab World is great, cheap and very enjoyable.*

*Arabic culture and history are very important and this is why we must visit the Arab World*

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
